#### BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING AUGUST 16, 2017

#### Approval of Ordinances 2017-02, 2017-03 and 2017-04; Amending Ordinance 96-1, Section 7 Water Rates, WAC Rates and the Zone A Pump Station Surcharges:

On June 30, 2017 a notice was mailed to all District Property owners. This notice explained in detail the proposed Base Rate Increase and Consumption Tiered Rate increases for all Residential, Grant School and Commercial, Industrial and Institutional customers. The Board of Directors held a public hearing on August 16, 2017, to receive comments on all of the proposed increases. Following closure of the public hearing and discussion by the full Board, the Board of Directors adopted Ordinances 2017-02, 2017-03 and 2017 -04. The new rates as depicted below become effective September 1, 2017.

# Placer Road—24" Water Main

The Board of Directors unanimously approved PACE Engineering to design and prepare the bid documents for the installation of 24" Ductile Iron Pipe along Placer Road between Simmons and Towerview Circle. Construction is anticipated to begin in the Spring of 2018.

# **ADA Improvements Project**

After reviewing the bids for the ADA Improvements Project, the Board of Directors awarded the contract to DC Construction, Inc. This project is currently in the design and permitting phase. Construction is estimated to begin in October and be completed in December. Improvements include a new ADA enterance door and restroom retrofit.





# Silver King Main Line Leak Repairs

In May, District staff responded to a main line break along Silver King Road. This stretch of pipe was installed in 1967 and is now 50 years old. The repair required the assistance of Eddie Axner Construction.

On August 25th, another water main break occurred at the intersection of Placer Road and Silver King Road. Eddie Axner Construction was again retained to aid in its repair.

The District will be researching this matter further.

# **About Labor Day**

The first Labor Day was held in 1882. Its origins stem from the desire of the Central Labor Union to create a holiday for workers. It became a federal holiday in 1894. It was originally intended that the day would be filled with a street parade to allow the public to appreciate the work of the trade and labor organizations. After the parade, a festival was to be held to amuse local workers and their families. In later years, prominent men and women held speeches. This is less common now, but is sometimes seen in election years. One of the reasons for choosing to celebrate this on the first Monday in September, and not on <u>May 1</u>, which is common in the rest of the world, was to add a holiday in the long gap between Independence Day and Thanksgiving.
