Board of Director's Meeting

August 21, 2019

Adoption of the Capital Budget for Fiscal Year 2019-2020: The Board of Directors unanimously adopted a balanced Capital Budget in the amount of \$498,795 for Fiscal Year 2019-20. This budget continues to include funds to complete the Office Conversion Project as well as final payments for the 24" main line extension along Placer Road.

AC Pipe Testing and Study

Over the last eight years, the District has experienced a significant increase in mainline breaks. Of the five experienced over the past eight years, four of them occurred within the last four years.



PACE Engineering, Inc. recommended that the District have the AC Pipe tested to determine its condition and estimate the remaining useful life of the pipe. The Board of Directors unanimously approved a proposal from Exponent for testing and analysis services. Total project cost: \$67,400.00.



Income Survey

The Board of Directors authorized the District to enter into an agreement with RCAC to conduct an Income Survey of its customers. The purpose of this survey is to establish a median household income which will then be used to explore funding options for upcoming capital projects. Additional information with more details will be provided in the future.

The Value of Our Water... Storage Facilities



Water storage is important for a number of reasons. Not only does it provide water during times of high demand for your personal use, it also ensures that there will be enough water available for fire protection.

The District operates and maintains five water storage reservoirs. These reservoirs are cleaned and inspected every three years to ensure a high quality water supply while also maintaining the asset.

District Reservoirs

Zone A Reservoir	Built in 1992	280,000 gallons
Zone A1 Reservoir	Built in 1992	90,000 gallons
Zone B Reservoir	Built in 1982	685,000 gallons
Zone C Reservoir	Built in 1967	150,000 gallons
Zone C #2 Reservoir	Built in 1996	1,000,000 gallons
